Rotaractors pair up with Habitat for Humanity to help neighborhood

The New Town neighborhood of Jacksonville, Fla., has been struggling for a long time, and it shows. In this area, creeks lie choked with old tires, jobs are few, and roughly 10 percent of the housing stock consists of abandoned or blighted homes.

“It seems like a stereotypical bad neighborhood,” says Tony Brazell, past president of Jacksonville’s First Coast Rotaract Club. But get to know it and its residents – as he and other Rotaractors are doing in partnership with Habitat for Humanity Jacksonville (also known as HabiJax) – and the view changes.

Rotaractors help build homes in Jacksonville, Fla.

Each January for the past six years, the First Coast Rotaractors have spent a day volunteering their muscle, sweat, and time to help HabiJax build houses for New Town residents.

Because HabiJax requires the people receiving the homes to donate a certain amount of labor as well, Rotaractors often find themselves working alongside neighborhood residents. “You end the day thinking, ‘I’m glad I was part of that – helping someone make their neighborhood a better place,’” Brazell says.

Club Past President Brett Bell, who has been part of the HabiJax event each year since its inception, has fond memories of learning to frame windows, as well as the year that he and two other Rotaractors got into a friendly siding-hanging competition. (No report as to who won.)

The best part, though? “Just hanging out with the other Rotaractors and getting to know some of them better,” Bell says. “At HabiJax, it’s such a long day that you really get to know one another.”

And not just one another. “On our most recent one, a guy walked through the site with a little dachshund,” says Brazell. “Everyone wanted to play with this dog. So we got to talking to this guy, and he says, ‘Oh, I’m just supervising your work. I helped build the HabiJax house across the street, and I just wanted to make sure you were treating my neighbors right.’ That says a lot.”



President Alex gave a HI \$20 for all of us participating in the many upcoming activities, such as the Pineapple Festival, Ho'ōla Nā Pua project, etc.



More than half of Rotarians worldwide receive a regional magazine instead of The Rotarian. These publications are produced independently by Rotarians, distributed in more than 130 countries, and published in 24 languages. They have a combined circulation of 872,000. Each magazine has a regional point of view but also includes articles and photographs of international interest from The Rotarian.

In addition, Rotary International publishes Rotary Canada, a quarterly supplement to The Rotarian with a circulation of 28,000.

Official and regional Rotary magazines, Rotary International's unique communications media are the official monthly magazine named The Rotarian, published in English language by the headquarters, and 30 other regional Rotary World Magazine Press periodicals that are independently produced in more than 20 different major languages and distributed in 130 countries.

The first official magazine, The National Rotarian, predecessor to The Rotarian, was started in January 1911. The first regional magazine was issued in 1915 in Great Britain and Ireland.



Today we had the pleasure of hearing just what **Derek Conselva** really does!

Derek is a Waipahu Boy who went to Waipahu High School and, for a while, a private school. He is one of eight siblings who lived in the old plantation area of Waipahu. Derek told us that his grandfather was a hard worker, carrying 100lb bags for 8 hours, which really made an impression on Derek.

Derek enjoys working with children so, for a while, he coached Pop Warner Football, in Waipahu, where he taught these kids how to play football. Derek was so dedicated, that if a player didn't have a ride to practice or home, he would give them a ride. One such player lived in Kalihi, so Derek picked him up and drove him home when he didn't have a ride. Derek was such an influence on his young players, and made such an impression on them, that when they became adults, he was always invited to birthday parties and weddings of his former players. At one wedding, one of his former players introduced Derek to his new bride, saying, "This is the man that taught me all I know about football!"

Today, Derek is in the process of starting a non-profit Ag program, called Farm to Table Academy, which will be tailored for high schools. The Academy will teach student everything they need to know about growing and selling their produce. This is a program that blends two types of businesses together, integrating new technology with old Hawaiian style farming.

He also loves helping with planting indigenous plants up on the mountain, where he recently did, with the **Oahu Army Natural Resources Program** team. It touches his heart.

Derek is the owner of **DC Sales and Marketing** that offers all types of services and products for energy saving, health and wellness, and financial services.

Derek told us that Rotary gives him an opportunity to give back to the community. He is our Mr. Volunteer, volunteering for anything that comes up.

Derek loves surfing so much that if you asking where he is going, he will say, "I'm going to a morning board meeting!"


