#### What's involved?

Rotaract members decide how to organize and run their clubs, manage their own funds, and plan and carry out activities and service projects. Rotary club sponsors offer guidance and support and work with your club as partners in service.

#### What are the benefits?

Connect with leaders in your community and around the world to:

- Discover new cultures and promote international understanding
- Become a leader in your school and community
- Have fun and make new friends from around the world

#### What's involved?

Interact clubs organize at least two projects every year, one that helps their school or community and one that promotes international understanding. Rotary club sponsors mentor and guide Interactors as they carry out projects and develop leadership skills.

## Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)



**Do you have what it takes to become a dynamic leader and change yourself and the world?**

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is an intensive leadership experience organized by Rotary clubs and districts where you develop your skills as a leader while having fun and making connections.

#### What are the benefits?

Connect with leaders in your community and around the world to:

- Build communication and problem-solving skills
- Discover strategies for becoming a dynamic leader in your school or community
- Learn from community leaders, inspirational speakers, and peer mentors
- Unlock your potential to turn motivation into action
- Have fun and form lasting friendships

#### What's involved?

RYLA events are organized locally by Rotary clubs and districts for participants ages 14-30. Depending on community needs, RYLA may take the form of a one-

day seminar, a three-day retreat, or a weeklong camp. Typically, events last 3-10 days and include presentations, activities, and workshops covering a variety of topics.



Your community might host a RYLA event for secondary school students to hone their leadership potential, for university students to develop creative problem-solving strategies, or for young professionals to learn ethical business practices.

**How can I participate?**

RYLA participants are nominated by local Rotary clubs. [Contact your local Rotary club](#) to find out more about RYLA events in your area, how to apply, and any costs of getting involved.



**Rotary Youth Exchange**



**Rotary Youth Exchange builds peace one young person at a time.**

Students learn a new language, discover another culture, and truly become global citizens. Exchanges for students ages 15-19 are sponsored by Rotary clubs in more than 100 countries.

**What are the benefits?**

Exchange students unlock their true potential to:

- Develop lifelong leadership skills
- Learn a new language and culture
- Build lasting friendships with young people from around the world
- Become a global citizen

**How long do exchanges last?**

Long-term exchanges last a full academic year, and students attend local schools and live with multiple host families.

Short-term exchanges last from several days to three months and are often structured as camps, tours, or homestays that take place when school is not in session.

### New Generations Service Exchange



*New Generations Service Exchange is a short-term, customizable program for university students and professionals up to age 30.*

Participants can design exchanges that combine their professional goals with a humanitarian project.

#### What are the benefits?

- Make connections with service-minded community leaders in another country
- Learn another language
- Build your professional skills and gain international experience
- Travel and explore a new culture while giving back through service

#### What is an exchange like?

With your host Rotary district, you'll plan activities that can include networking, relationship building, humanitarian service, professional development, and leadership training. Exchanges:

- Last from a few weeks to six months
- Can be arranged for individuals or groups
- Need not be reciprocal

#### How much does it cost?

Costs vary by Rotary club or district. To reduce expenses, Rotary members often provide homestay options, arrange no-cost internship or job-shadowing programs, and offer other financial assistance.

#### How do I apply?



### HEALING THOUSANDS

*As thousands of refugees streamed into Berlin, they strained the health care system. Rotarian and physician Pia Skarabis-Querfeld spent the last three years building a network of volunteer doctors to help those in need.*

On the nightly news and around her city, Pia Skarabis-Querfeld saw the refugees arriving in Berlin after fleeing war, persecution, and poverty in their home countries.

Wanting to help, she gathered a bag of clothes to donate and headed to a nearby gym filled with refugees.

What began as a single act of charity eventually evolved into an all-encompassing volunteer project:

Over the next three years, Skarabis-Querfeld would build and run a network that, at peak times, would include more than 100 volunteers helping thousands of refugees at community centers, tent camps, and other shelters across the city.

Answer to this week's Quiz: 1884




Rotary **Egg beater**. Invented by Willis Johnson, the **egg beater** was patented in 1884. Originally, he indented the device as a mixing machine not intended to whisk the eggs only. The rotary beater transfers the action of whisking into gears, which saves a lot of effort.



African-American, Willis Johnson, of Cincinnati, Ohio, patented and improved the mechanical egg beater (U.S. pat# 292,821) on February 5, 1884. The beater was made up of a handle attached to a series of spring-like whisk wires used to help mix ingredients.

Prior to his eggbeater, all mixing of ingredients was done by hand and was quite labor-intensive and time-consuming.


In fact, what Willis Johnson had really intervened was the early mixing machine and not just an egg beater. His device was not intended for eggs alone. Johnson had designed his egg beater and mixer for eggs, batter, and other baker's ingredients. It was a double-acting machine with two chambers. Batter could be beaten in one section and eggs could be beaten in another section, or one section could be cleaned while the other section could continue beating.
