





June is Rotary Fellowships Month!

Rotary Fellowships Month - June is designated as “Rotary Fellowships Month” by the RI Board to recognize the importance of international fellowship and good will among Rotarians with similar recreational interests, vocations, and health and medical issue-oriented interests, to promote increased participation in fellowships and increase understanding of this program. The RI Board encourages fellowships groups to highlight activities through projects, activities, and events in celebration of “Rotary Fellowships Month” in June.

How Rotary Fellowships Operate

Each Fellowship is officially recognized by the RI Board of Directors, but operates independently of Rotary International, with its own rules, dues requirements, and administrative structure.

Membership in fellowships is open to Rotarians, spouses of Rotarians and Rotaractors.

Each fellowship must maintain a membership base representing at least three different countries.

Each fellowship elects at least three officers to oversee the group’s operations.

Fellowships are expected to facilitate communication amongst their members and to maintain regular communication with Rotary International.



The Founding Executive Committee consisted of Sergeant Geoffrey Little, Rotary Club of (then) Wollstonecraft, Sydney, Australia, Sheriff Mike Milas, Rotary Club of Port Washington, Wisconsin, USA, and Sergeant Robert Schottlander, Rotary Club of Fonthill, Ontario, Canada.

At the time, the Fellowship grew to in excess of one hundred correspondents.

The Fellowship looks forward to your "Expression of Interest" either in the form of a letter, fax or email and is open to all Rotarian Serving and Former Serving Members of Police and Law Enforcement, including those who have been accorded ‘Honorary Membership’ of a Rotary Club; are the recipients of a ‘Paul Harris Fellowship’ or have served as a member of a Group Study Exchange (GSE) Team from anywhere in the world to anywhere in the world.

As a Rotarian, Honorary Rotarian, Paul Harris Fellowship Recipient or existing or Past GSE Team Member, you are already a ‘Nominal Member’ of Polepfor. ‘Associate’ Membership is open to the ‘Friends of Polepfor’.

The Objectives of the Fellowship are to promote the fraternal ties which exist within Police and Law

Enforcement, and to engage in Professional and Cultural exchanges, with a view to enhancing the work of Rotary and Police and Law Enforcement, locally, nationally and internationally.

Opportunities for Fellowship

Most Rotarians are successful professional and business executives because they hear opportunities knock and

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take advantage of them. Once a week the opportunity for Rotary fellowship occurs at each club meeting, but not all members hear it knocking.

The weekly club meeting is a special privilege of Rotary membership. It provides the occasion to visit with fellow members, to meet visitors you have not known before, and to share your personal friendship with other members.

Rotary clubs which have a reputation of being "friendly clubs" usually follow a few simple steps: First, members are encouraged to sit in a different seat or at a different table each week. Second, Rotarians are urged to sit with a member they may not know as well as their long-time personal friends. Third, members invite new members or visitors to join their table just by saying: "Come join us, we have an empty chair at this table."

Fourth, members share the conversation around the table rather than merely eating in silence or talking privately to the person next to them. Fifth, Rotarians make a special point of trying to get acquainted with all members of the club by seeking out those they may not know.

When Rotarians follow these five easy steps, an entirely new opportunity for fellowship knocks each week. Soon Rotarians realize that warm and personal friendship is the cornerstone of every great Rotary club.

The American Business Women’s Association (ABWA) “Be the Heroine of Your Life” in the American Business Women’s Association

Today, we had our bright and enthusiastic member-to-be, **Paulette Kitchell Fukumoto**, President of the **American Business Women’s Association** and **Director of Miss Honolulu and Miss Ala Moana Preliminary Pageant** speak to us.

Paulette is a Wahiawa girl and a Leilehua HS grad. As president of ABWA, she travels all over the US. Wherever she goes, she wants to tell people about her hometown, Wahiawa, so more of the mainland folks know where we are and the uniqueness of Wahiawa.

Many of the original members of the Hawaii ABWA are still active and provide guidance and support to the association.

Paulette told us that ABWA helped her with public speaking, through mentorship of the original members.

Hawaii ABWA, encourages and assists women desiring to start a business. They provide the guidance and continue to provide direction until the business is up and running. To do this, they provide one-on-one support, holding hands until the new business owner is comfortable and established in her business.

Now a bit more about ABWA

The American Business Women’s Association is a national professional association for women, established by Kansas City businessman, Hilary Bufton,



Jr. On Sept. 22, 1949, Mr. Bufton and three Kansas City businesswomen incorporated the American Business Women's Association. It celebrated its 71st birthday this year!

On September 22, 1949, Shirley Cupp, Irma Beisel, Frances Stuckey and Mr. Hilary Bufton Jr. met in a coffee shop in downtown Kansas City to incorporate the American Business Women's Association at a time when it was considered socially unacceptable for women to pursue a full-time career, have a girls night out or even join an association.

A statement made by Mr. Bufton in the early 50s summarizes ABWA's impact on societal norms: "In many ways, the first generation of ABWA members were the breaking tradition...Without even knowing it, I guess they were paving the way for today's women."



Women have always worked, whether it was in the home or in the business sector. During the height of WWII, women were not only encouraged to enter the workforce, they were deluged with propaganda to join the workforce because it was their patriotic duty. When the war was over, many women lost their jobs, and were reminded that their first responsibility was to their home and their family.

While women's opportunities and pay in the business sector have evolved, there is still work to be done. Breaking barriers for women and on behalf of women is nothing new in ABWA. We've been doing so since 1949!

ABWA'S MISSION

The mission of the American Business Women's Association is to bring together business women of diverse occupations and to provide opportunities for them to help themselves and others grow personally and professionally through leadership, education, networking support and national recognition.

PARTNERSHIPS AND OUTREACH

ABWA partners with other organizations to promote important dates and events that will have a positive impact on women's lives including:

- The American Cities Business Journal. ACBJ hosts Biz Mentoring Monday Event in 43 different cities in the U.S. The event attracts more than 10,000 women nationwide each year. As an ABWA, you are eligible for a discounted registration.
- A member of the Small Business Saturday Coalition sponsored by American Express and Women Impacting Public Policy. Small Business Saturday promotes "shopping small." Small Business Saturday, the first Saturday following the Thanksgiving holiday.
- Starr Women's Hall of Fame (Kansas City Based) recognizes women from the Kansas City area for their contributions to the community.
- The American Business Women's Foundation (ABWF) whose purpose is to educate women about issues and opportunities impacting parity in the workplace.

ABWA Arrives in Hawaii in 1978!

ABWA 'Onipa'a Chapter

The 'Onipa'a Chapter of ABWA was founded in 1978 by a group of Hawaii women who had the vision that women in business were going to play a major role in the community and needed the support of an organization where they could network, learn new skills, and raise money for scholarship. Since its founding, the 'Onipa'a Chapter has had a positive lasting impact on its members, and has awarded nearly \$50,000 in scholarships to women pursuing their education goals.



ABWA in Hawaii

There are currently three active ABWA Chapters in Hawaii (all on Oahu):

The Hawaii ABWA also provides scholarships to deserving women between \$2,500-\$5,000. To do this, they have fundraisers such as bingo.

As the and Director of Miss Honolulu and Miss Ala Moana Preliminary Pageant, Paulette is responsible for planning events, providing food and for the program, which can be time consuming, working from the 3rd floor of Saks Off 5th Ave at Ala Moana Shopping Center.

These events have Paulette catering to some heavy hitter clients, so everything has to be just right!

One such event, Paulette had to charter a plane and fly 350 clients to Maui for a pageant. The kicker was, she had to have them back the same night! All worked out and the event was a total success.
