Shortly after graduating from the University of Hawaii, and in his first professional job, he was invited to a Rotary meeting. Mark is forever grateful to his sponsor PDG Mike Lyons for that lunch. 40 years later he has served in many Rotary leadership roles, including Chief of Staff, Assistant Governor, International Service project chair and RYLA chair. Mark was part of the organizing committee and charter member of the Rotary Club of Metropolitan Honolulu, where he served as club president in 1994-95.

Professionally, Mark is President of AlohaGraphics, a print shop in Honolulu. With a focus on color digital printing, the shop recently started its 27th year. In addition to Rotary, Mark has been active in Scouting programs since elementary school days in Kailua. As a Scoutmaster, he helped 50 young men earn the rank of Eagle Scout. He received the BSA Silver Beaver Award and is a recipient of the Cliff Dochterman Award.

Rotary is a family affair, he met Kathleen through Rotary. She is also a past president of the Metropolitan Honolulu club and a past Assistant Governor for Oahu Windward area clubs. Their 2 children grew up at Rotary projects and now four grandchildren keep their lives joyful and active.

DG Mark was delighted being here tonight. It brought back memories of visits many, many years ago, when our Club had lots of members. Mark stressed the importance of increasing membership. It is important because The Rotary Club of Wahiawa-Waialua is the third oldest club in the District, we need to keep our history alive. It is also one of the goals of Rotary International, grow membership! We are doing great!

DG Mark mentioned that he has visited clubs, varying in size and makeup, meeting in parks and locations, other than restaurants! DG Mark has discovered that each club is very different than the other clubs, and they are unique in their uniqueness!

One of DG Mark's goals is to have joint club projects, clubs joining each other to show the community that we are in their midst doing good things. He said that, at some point, we should invite community members to join us in our projects and share in the fun!

DG Mark also touched on the importance of The Rotary Foundation and all the good work they are doing in each area of service. He told us that the foundation is spending \$1B a day supporting grant projects submitted by Rotary clubs. A lot of these grants are joint grants with two to three+ clubs participating.

He also informed us that the money we contribute today, will return to us in three years for us to use for grants in doing good in the world!
