Marie reported that the **Ka'ala Elementary School** was incredibly thankful for the Club's donation of \$200. The School also wants to stay connected with the Club and may have service projects that we can participate in.

### **Future Projects and Programs**

Suggestions of proposed activities. Arthur Hughes inquired whether UH Season Tickets might be a good idea for fundraising. Mac suggested that we could do a raffle for the tickets. Marie asked members for further suggestions for fundraising and service projects. Mark Anthony was named Service Project Chair. Derek shared August-October Volunteer Opportunities with the Army Natural Resources Program. On August 5<sup>th</sup> and August 12<sup>th</sup> from 8am – 12pm, there's a parent workday at Hoala School where members can volunteer or donate refreshments. Tentative date for a golf tournament is the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday in June (June 30<sup>th</sup>).

# **Documentation of Participation**

The documentation is for Rotary to be more visible. The Wahiawa Lions Club is hosting the 6<sup>th</sup> Annual Wahiawa



War Memorial Ceremony on August 12<sup>th</sup> from 2pm – 4pm. Please email Marie if you're able to attend. Arthur emailed the Dept. of Facilities Maintenance about adopting a stream to clean up a canal area in Waianae – this could be a multi-Club effort. Marie would like the Club to participate in more activities with Mililani Sunrise.

#### **Fundraising**

1. Dinner and Silent Auction at Mango Street Grill -

we could solicit businesses for donations for the silent auction and keep the proceeds from the auction. We could sell tables and individual seat tickets for a buffet dinner with live entertainment. Hopefully, we can find people to play music for free as a donation to the club. This could be an annual event to raise funds as well as recruit members.

2. Zippy's Fundraising Tickets - Having each member sell at least 20 tickets each at \$11 per ticket would yield the club \$100 per member. At 10 members, this would be \$1,000. Maybe we can do this twice per year to start?

3. **T-Shirt Sale** - I'd be happy to design a shirt that is customized to our Rotary Club that we could put up for sale. I'd have to look into the cost of producing t-shirts to determine how much to charge and how much profit we'd make.

#### **Community Service**

1. Food Distribution - I believe that Surfing the Nations in Wahiawa conducts a food distribution on Thursdays; we could link with them to assist.

2. Toys for Tots - Perhaps we could work with Schofield or Kaneohe Marine Corps. Base to get donations for toys that we can wrap and distribute to kids in Wahiawa/Waialua.

3. Mokuleia Beach Clean-up - People often have bonfires and leave nails all over the beach, not to mention trash from gatherings. This might be a good opportunity for a service project in partnership with Schofield.

#### Meeting Schedule and Location

We meet on the 1st and 3rd Thursday of each Month. For those months that have 5 Thursdays, then can be used for Board meetings if required.

Beginning on August 3<sup>rd</sup> and after, we will be meeting at the Ho'ala School Conference room on the Wahiawa Hongwanji Mission.
