World Polio Day 2023. World Polio provides an opportunity to highlight global efforts toward a polio-free world and honor the tireless contributions of those on the frontlines in the fight to eradicate polio from every corner of the globe.

Since 1978, Rotary Internationals has worked tirelessly, fighting to eradicate Polio from the face of the earth. A couple of times we were so close, but cases keep popping up. The reason is, a country to be classified as polio-free, they have to report three years of 0 polio cases.





The song, "America the Beautiful," was based on a poem written by the professor, poet, and writer, Katharine Lee Bates, during an 1893 trip to Colorado Springs, Colorado. When she got to the top of Pike's Peak, the view was so beautiful that it inspired her to write, "All the wonder of America seemed displayed there, with the sea-like expanse."

The poem that Bates wrote first appeared in print in The Congregationalist, a weekly journal, on July 4, 1895. Within a few months, it was set to music by Silas G. Pratt. Bates revised the song in 1904, after receiving many requests to use the song in publications and special services. An additional change was made to the wording of the third verse in 1913 to give us the version we know today. The song is considered by some to be the country's unofficial national anthem.

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years, and we've made incredible progress in the fight to rid the world of it forever. As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, we've helped to reduced polio cases by more than 99.9 percent.





PolioPlus

PolioPlus is a Signature Program of The Rotary Foundation.

What does Plus stand for in PolioPlus?

The "Plus" is something else that is provided as a part of the polio eradication campaign. It might be a hand-operated tricycle or access to water. It might be additional medical treatment, bed nets, or soap.

The Polio Immunization Program

Our guest speaker, PDG (2005 – 06) ROZ Cooper, RC of Metro Honolulu, is a busy Rotarian, supporting many, many activities within District 5000, Zone 26/27 and Rotary International. Locally, Roz is a member of the Council on Legislation as a representative, on the PolioPlus Subcommittee, and a part of Zone 26/27 team. Her passion is eradicating Polio from the face of the world.

Operation Polio Vaccine Distribution – Ghana, Africa



Before getting into her adventure, Roz asked us, "What is Polio?

Briefly, Polio is a viral disease that is transmitted mainly from person to person, mainly through a faecal-oral route. While there is no cure for polio, the disease can be prevented through the administration of a vaccine. If a population is fully immunized, they will be protected against all forms of polioviruses.

It is prevalent in highly populated and remote areas, where sanitary conditions are poor or non-existent.

Roz told us, with all the effort and hard work, polio "is still out there." It is a horrible disease.

Roz thrilled us with the story of her first Polio immunization program she went on! It was a harrowing, exciting, memorable, and rewarding beyond belief.

Roz made her first trip to **Ghana**, in **West Africa**, next to the country of **Côte d'Ivoire**, in 2001. The country is made up of plains and scrublands, rainforests and savannas.

Soon after arriving, Roz and 16 members from District 5000, with 60 other Rotarians from around the world, made the arduous trip into the interior, going to remote villages, where the patients were.

The trip to the remote village was a long and hard one because of road conditions.



In countries like Ghana, teams go to the children, not the children coming to the teams.

One of the major hurdles that had to get over, was the belief of the elders and mothers, that they were there to sterilize their children. So those administering the vaccine started wearing the Rotary vest, and hats to gain the trust of the villagers.





It didn't help that Roz, when giving her first immunization dose to a little baby, that she accidently squeezed the vial, and it slipped out of her hand and ended up in the baby's mouth! Roz survived this episode!

These vaccine teams didn't go out on their own, they always had field workers accompany them, advisors that know the culture and spoke the language.

What was it like in the middle of nowhere?

Roz told us that there was no running water, electricity, bathrooms or sanitary service, so they had to be extra careful. They had to train themselves on consumption of food and water, to minimize the "urge" to go. The only other option was going in the wild to relieve themselves.

They were issued bottled water and always had bottles with them. The water was not used for bathing, only for drinking, washing your face and brushing your teeth. This meant no showers, sometimes for three days.

Meals were also very challenging. Sometimes they had to eat what the villagers provided.

Hotel accommodations were next to none. What we would consider a "no-star" hotel elsewhere, was a five-star in the area their base headquarters was!

Complaining was not an option. Roz said you just accepted your situation, remembered why you were there, and what you there for, and got down to business the best you could.

Through all the hardships experienced, Roz said it was an experience she would never forget!

It was a good feeling at the end of the trip, after administering the vaccine to the little ones, knowing that they would be protected against all polio types.

After returning home Roz disposed of all her clothes, and said, "Never again!" But guess what? Again, and many, many again's have passed with the satisfaction of work well done.

How successful was this program in Ghana? The immunization program that started in Ghana in 1978, was certified polio free in 2015, after over five years of having no reported case of poliovirus. Sadly, there were just three cases reported in 2022. So, you see, as Roz said, "It's still out there."

With positive reports like this, Roz is a top supporter of the world-wide program and works tirelessly in the program.

Polio Update

According to the World Health Organization, (WHO) there were three cases reported in 2022.

The Center for Disease Control (CDC) reported, in 2022, Ghana Malawi and Mozambique reported wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) cases linked to a Pakistan strain, the first WPV1 cases in the African region since 2016. During 2022 and 2023, Afghanistan and Pakistan reported WPV1 cases. Circulating vaccinederived polioviruses were detected in areas of the world where poliovirus had been eliminated. The fight goes on!




