

September is Rotary Intranational **Basic Education and Literacy Monty!**

"More Than 776 Million People Over the Age of 15 Are Illiterate. That's 17 Percent of the World Adult Population."

The Rotary theme for the month of September is Basic Education and Literacy, which usually brings to mind ensuring that children have an education and learning skills that will support them in later life. Interestingly there are several facts that may or may not surprise you.

Rotary's goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy in education, and increase adult literacy. We support education for all children and literacy for children and adults. Rotary members worldwide fight adult illiteracy by working with local advocates to offer community literacy programs.

Rotary members make amazing things happen, like:

Opening schools: In Afghanistan, Rotary members opened a girls' school to break the cycle of poverty and social imbalance.

Teaching adults to read: Rotary members in the United States partnered with ProLiteracy Detroit to recruit and train tutors after a study showed that more than half of the local adult population was functionally illiterate.

New teaching methods: The SOUNS program in South Africa, Puerto Rico and the United States teaches

educators how to improve literacy by teaching children to recognize letters by sounds instead of names.

Making schools healthy: Rotarians are providing clean, fresh water to every public school in Lebanon so students can be healthier and get a better education.

Enhancing educational systems: In Kenya, Rotary clubs are working with the Global Partnership for Education and local and national governments to advance life-long learning opportunities for poor and marginalized children.

ROTARY MINUTE


In addition to a Rotary Minute, we have Rotary Moments! What are the differences?

Sully Sullivan, Founder of HRYF! Maurice J. "Sully" Sullivan (October 1909 – February 28, 1998) was an immigrant from Ireland who moved to Hawaii and was the co-founder, with See Goo Lau, of Foodland Super Markets, the largest and only locally owned supermarket chain in Hawaii. The first store opened on May 6, 1948 in Honolulu, Hawaii. By 2007, Foodland stores could be found on each of the four largest Hawaiian Islands. "Sully" also famously introduced McDonald's to Hawaii in 1968 as well as Dunkin' Donuts.

Sully introduced Portuguese Bean Soup at most of the McDonald's! This was a bold move, since no francize could add to the menu without prior approval form McDonald's HQ. But, when they found out how popular it was, Sully was allowed to keep it on the menu. This was the birth of local-style menu items such as Clam Chowder in the Northeast States!


Derek's Report.

Origin of the Dictionary Project

The Dictionary Project was originally the idea of Annie Plummer of Savannah, GA. In 1992, she gave away 50 dictionaries to local school children. Eventually, she raised funds to give 17,000 children in Savannah a dictionary! Bonnie Beeferman in Hilton Head, SC, read about Ms. Plummer's project and started her own dictionary giveaway in her community.

She was so overwhelmed by requests from teachers, that she reached out for help. Mary French and her husband Arno from Charleston answered her request by starting the Dictionary Project, a 501(c)3, in 1995.

To date, 28+ million children have now received dictionaries! Civic clubs, businesses, individuals and parent groups have sponsored projects in all 50 states and a growing number of international locations.

Mission Statement

The goal of this program is to assist all students in becoming good writers, active readers, creative thinkers, and resourceful learners by providing them with their own personal dictionary. The dictionaries are a gift to each student to use at school and at home for years to come. Educators see third grade as the dividing line between learning to read and reading to learn, so we encourage our sponsors to give dictionaries each year to children in the third grade. Value-Added Building in Waiawa



Chris Bailey

Chris Bailey, is the Project Manager at Leeward
Community College, for the Wahiawa Value-Added
Product Development Center. He is an alumnus of
Hōʻala School, Punahou, and Lewis and Clark.

The son of an immigrant entrepreneur from southern Thailand, Chris's passion for food and small business stems from childhood afternoons in his mother and aunt's Waipahu restaurant where they served Thai and local food. He saw how his mother's dedication gave him and his brother opportunities she didn't have, like attending Punahou, where the connections he made helped frame food entrepreneurship as a tangible career path.

Chris Bailey presentation provided information on the new Wahiawa Venture, Wahiawa Value Added Product Development Center, which opened this Fall. He has worked on this project for many years through the efforts of people like Senator Donovan Dela Cruz. Chris wants to work with the Ag industry, early college student level entrepreneurs, and current and emerging entrepreneurs.



Wahiawa Venture, Wahiawa Value Added Product
Development Center

The Center is a state-of-the-art 33,000 sq. ft. space with on-staff expertise to educate students, farmers, entrepreneurs, etc. to step into the value-added product economy. It is a project of Leeward Community College and the State of Hawai'i, contributing to the growth of Hawai'i's agricultural industry and entrepreneurial community through:

- Premier educational programming to students and community members, empowering Hawai'i's entrepreneurial ecosystem for generations to come.
- Increased opportunities for local farmers and growers to sell their products to value-added producers.
- Supporting local entrepreneurs to incubate their business through access to small business resources, production kitchens and in-house product and process development.

The Center offers product development consultation services, lab testing and production kitchens.

They serve Hawai'i's producers, processors, entrepreneurs, farmers, and students. We are committed to taking value-added food and beverage products to market and advancing Hawai'i foods across the alobe.

Other information Chris talked about was:

- The project cost \$21.6 million to build and furnish
- A local hot sauce maker or jam maker who make products at home will be able to use kettles and filling machines to be able to increase their output, open new market possibilities, and realize an economy of scale.
- Will work with farmers' products that aren't necessarily good for sale to develop different products.
- Is meant to mimic the flow for a producer including cold storage, production kitchen, dock, etc.
- 12,000 sq. ft. of the center is kitchen space split across 5 kitchen spaces; 2 are a wet side (including steam, gas, etc. for jam, papaya chutney, hot sauces, etc. that require a hood system) and 3 are a cold side for dry products, including an allergen area.

- Will educate users in their media kitchen to teach social media marketing. There's a second-floor mezzanine to be used as an open floor co-working area that can be used to host larger format seminars/classes.
- Have a pressure system, the first of its kind in the state, to extend the shelf life of various products.
- Will function as a satellite campus of Leeward Community College. They're currently working on the mechanism for students to be able to eventually earn college credits for their work in the center.
- The Center will be open during traditional business hours, once it starts up.

Tonight, Naomi provided our Club with the "how to" in Rotary ClubRunner programs, our Club's management tool and application.

What is ClubRunner? ClubRunner is a powerful software program that improves membership collaboration and accelerates growth!

Founded in 2003, ClubRunner began as a project by the Rotary District 7080 Website Chair, a long time Rotarian and Past President of the Mississauga City Center Rotary Club who is also a world-class software executive who has worked with software companies such as IBM in the past. As a software provider for major banks and insurance companies, his own company was already using the latest technology to manage online databases, generate dynamic documents and perform time saving work flow functions within an organization. Working closely with his home district and club, along with his highly experienced team, they started out with a mission to change the way membership clubs and associations function and connect with members by automating administrative functions and aligning them to the way non-profits work.

Answer to the Quiz of the Week. What is the world's smallest country. **Vatican City!**



Vatican City, a city-state surrounded by Rome, Italy, is the headquarters of the Roman Catholic Church. It's home to the Pope and a trove of iconic art and architecture. Its Vatican Museums house ancient Roman sculptures such as the famed "Laocoön and His Sons" as well as Renaissance frescoes in the Raphael Rooms and the Sistine Chapel, famous for Michelangelo's ceiling.

It is encircled by a 2-mile border with Italy, Vatican City is an independent city-state that covers just over 100 acres, making it one-eighth the size of New York's Central Park. Vatican City is governed as an absolute monarchy with the pope at its head.

The dispute between the Italian government and the Catholic Church ended in 1929 with the signing of the Lateran Pacts, which allowed the Vatican to exist as its own sovereign state and compensated the church \$92 million (more than \$1 billion in today's money) for the Papal States. The Vatican used the payment as seed money to re-grow its coffers. Mussolini, the head of the Italian government, signed the treaty on behalf of King Victor Emmanuel III.









