

January is Rotary International Vocational Service Month

Rotary has designated January as Vocational Service Month. The Object of Rotary is a philosophical statement of Rotary's purpose and the responsibilities of Rotarians. The concept of vocational service is rooted in the second "Object of Rotary", which calls on Rotarians to encourage and foster:

- High Ethical Standards in business and professions
- The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and
- The dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to service society.

This month, clubs are encouraged to provide opportunities for members to talk about their professions at their clubs and to learn about fellow members' occupations; use member skills and expertise to serve their communities; help young people to achieve career goals; provide guidance and encouragement to others in their professional development; and to practice their professions with integrity while inspiring others to behave ethically through words and actions. Bring Vocational Service to life by undertaking these activities. Vocational service is the essence of Rotary and serves as the foundation from which we serve our communities ground the world.

All Rotarians and guests/visitors that will be interacting with children and high school students must complete background check (good for 2 years) and attend one formal Youth Protection training. This requirement is a RI and Rotary District 5000 Requirement. The Youth Protection Guide can be found at the Rotary District 5000 web page at:

This guide is there to protect you, the student, and RI.




Martin Luther King Jr.

PP Geoff took this opportunity to provide a presentation for our upcoming visit to our Sister Club in Takasaki, Japan. PP Geoff discussed the following in his presentation:

- The proposed Travel Itinerary, covering April 1st to the 10th. We will be flying from Honolulu to Haneda Airport, which is the closest airport to Takasaki by Train. It is about an hour train ride.
- We will meet up with our Sister Club members on April 3rd.
- There will be time to spend with our Sister Club members, attend a club meeting, on Friday, participate in a joint community project, and sightsee in and around the Takasaki area, with possible side trips to Tokyo, Osaka, and Kyoto.
- Suggested Activities:




What technology was named after a Danish king? The Blue Tooth.



King Harald Bluetooth

The Bluetooth wireless specification design was named after the king, King Harald Bluetooth, in 1997, based on an analogy that the technology would unite devices the way Harold Bluetooth united the tribes of Denmark into a single kingdom. The Bluetooth logo consists of a Younger Futhark bind rune for his initials, H (*) and B (\$).



What in the heck is a Younger Futhark bind rune? In the Latin alphabet, letters H and B; * (Hagall) and B (Berkanan) together, form **a bind rune**. The two letters form the initials 'H B', alluding to the Danish king and Viking raider **Harald Bluetooth**.
