

# Part V Rotary's Promise Club




A designation provided to clubs in which every duespaying member supports The Rotary Foundation's Endowment with a minimum commitment of \$1,000 or more in an estate plan or via an outright gift of \$1,000 or more. A certificate honoring the achievement will be provided upon request.

#### **Every Rotarian, Every Year Club**



For clubs that achieve a minimum Annual Fund contribution of \$100 per capita during the Rotary year, and every dues-paying member must personally contribute at least \$25 to the Annual Fund during the year.

#### Top Three Per Capita in Annual Fund Giving



For the three clubs in each district that give the most, per capita, to the Annual Fund. Clubs that give at least \$50 per capita are eligible.

#### **Rotaract Giving Certificate**



Rotaract clubs that collectively contribute \$100 or more annually to The Rotary Foundation will be eligible for a Rotaract Giving Certificate.

#### **Naming Opportunities**



Special opportunities are available to create an endowment or make a directed gift in your name or the name of a loved one. Endowed gifts are invested in perpetuity, with part of their earnings spent on a designated program. Directed gifts are spent in their entirety, usually in the following Rotary year.


In response to President Yoshio-San's question, we are working on a Global Grant in one of three locations.

It is the home of the famous **Daruma doll**, where they are still made today.



A Special Daruma Doll

The history of the Daruma dates back to the 17th Century. It was local farmers in the city of Takasaki, in the Gunma prefecture, that crafted the first version of these dolls, as charms to be blessed by monks.

Daruma dolls are symbols of perseverance and good luck. The dolls are also used for setting goals. As you reach each goal, you fill in one of the eyes, with blank ink or paint.


